PERWANI@YourService allows local communities to build their resilience, enhance their knowledge base and gain a sense of responsibility for their own community. Not only that it inspires others for social transformation, the NBOS initiative promotes social cohesion and trust through collective action that leads to sustainable outcomes for the Rakyat and by the Rakyat. Such initiative is crucial in order to ensure that no one is left behind by reaching out to people, including those marginalised or difficult to reach and to bring people's voices and knowledge into collective actions. PERWANI members assume a significant role in connecting governmental strategies and initiatives with complementary, yet essential, community voluntary action particularly through PERWANI Lay Counsellors. They do not only provide a helping hand but also provide psychosocial support in times of needs. This has been proven during the disaster management of the recent event of flood in various states in Malaysia.

Besides volunteerism, entrepreneurship is another critical element for the NBOS initiatives under the MWFCD in 2017. NBOS recognises women entrepreneurship as an important source of economic growth. Women entrepreneurs are not only able to

generate income but also to create new jobs for others. The NBOS initiative helps to minimise gender-based barriers to starting and growing their businesses such as lack of access to capital and business space as well as limited mobility and access to information and networks. Women entrepreneurship can make a particularly strong contribution to the economic well-being of the family and communities, poverty reduction and women's empowerment. This helps to contribute towards achieving the SDGs. Hence, the MWFCD is actively undertaking promotion of women entrepreneurs through the NBOS initiatives known as Bazar Wanita Satu Malaysia (BW1M) and Laman Wanita (LaWa).

To be competitive, women entrepreneurs must quickly meet current needs, adapt to marketplace changes and provide high value and cost-effectiveness.

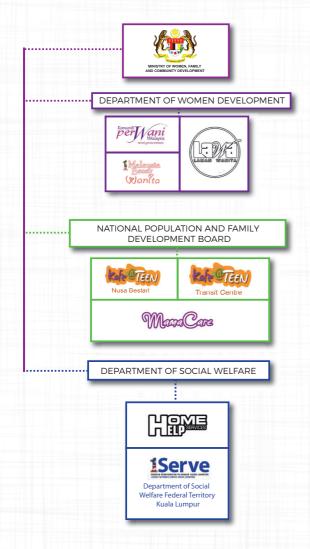

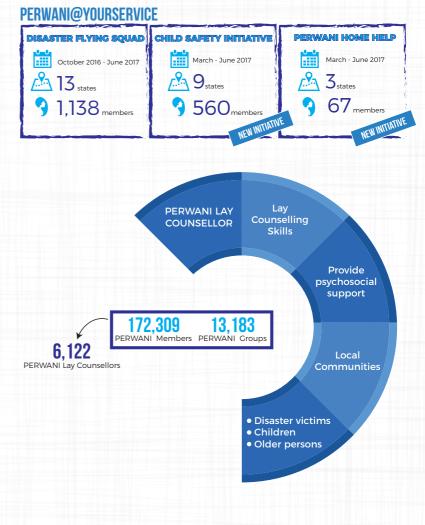

Bazar Wanita 1Malaysia (BW1M) initiative was introduced and launched in 2012 by Tan Sri Dr. Ali Hamsa, Chief Secretary to the Government of Malaysia at the FAMA Market, Precinct 2, Putrajaya.

As of 2016, BW1M has been implemented in 12 states with the participation of 138 women entrepreneurs.

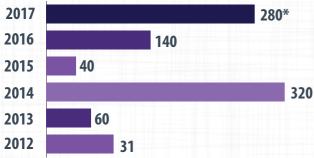

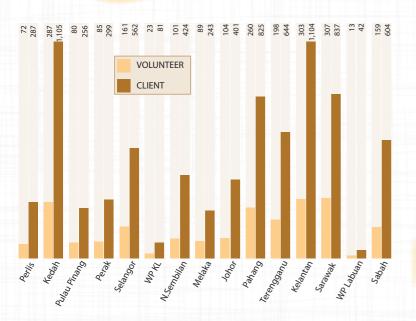

JKM managed to save **79.47%** per month for every PWD compared to the cost that the Government has to pay if the same PWD is institutionalised in Taman Sinar Harapan.

JKM also save **74.71%** per month for every older person compared to the cost if he/she is institutionalised in Rumah Seri Kenangan.

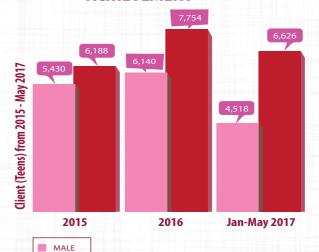

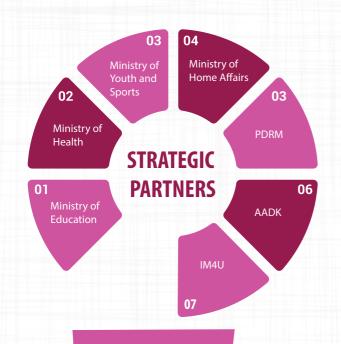

WAY FORWARD

The Department of Social Welfare has planned to expand 1Serve to other states. Seven (7) Department of Social Welfare offices (State and District) have been identified to implement this project.
